BOOK REVIEWS

TEIHON YANAGITA KUNIO SHU, 36 Vols. Tokyo: Chikuma Shobô, from 1962. (The last volume in still being compiled). Average number of pages, 550; priced from \(\fomath{\text{1}}\),100 to \(\fomath{\text{1}}\),600 per volume.

In his scores of years spent in research, Kunio Yanagita (1875-1962) published an enormous number of books, articles, essays and even poems, all of which stimulated the development of folklore studies in Japan. Those concerned with folklore have been handicapped by the fact that a number of his publications are out of print. Yanagita never ceased from laboriously noting corrections in red ink, a habit he also had when inspecting any kind of publication. Many of his manuscripts were left unpublished and those articles or essays published in various journals were the least accessible to ordinary students of folklore. With his consent an authorized edition of his works was undertaken by several of his students, and beginning in January, 1962, a few months before his death, one volume was published each month. Each volume is arranged around a given topic or center of interest. Titles appearing are those of books unless otherwise indicated. When the book was compiled from earlier articles, information about their earlier appearance is noted in a section at the end of the volume.

The publication has been edited by Tokihiko Oto, professor of folklore, and Hisako Kamata, lecturer in folklore, both of Seijo University, Tokyo, and other collaborators.
